

Terms of Reference - Education Fellow at the Balfour Project Fellowship Programme

The Balfour Project is offering opportunities for passionate individuals to join the Fellowship Programme for the 2024/25 academic year. As the Balfour Project Education Fellow, you will have the chance to work with our education team on meaningful projects, gain valuable experience developing resources and delivering workshops, and build relationships with schools.

Responsibilities:

- 1. Support the Education Officer with outreach to schools to promote the KS3-5 'Mandatory Palestine: Colonial Practices and Resistance' workshop.
- 2. Undergo training to lead this workshop independently in London schools.
- 3. Support the Education Officer with promotion of new KS3 resources to schools and education organisations and networks.
- 4. Participate in the Balfour Project Fellowship training programme.

Qualifications, experience, and skills:

Essential

- Currently enrolled in, or recently completed a BA or Master's degree in History, or History PGCE degree. History PhD candidates are also encouraged to apply.
- Knowledge of, and interest in, late 19th and 20th century history of Palestine and Israel.
- Excellent research skills.
- Outstanding written and verbal communication skills.
- Highly organised, detail-oriented, and able to work independently.



Desirable

- Previous experience working with schools/facilitating workshops/developing educational resources.

Benefits:

- 1. Gain hands-on experience in P/I education.
- 2. Work in a passionate team.
- 3. Benefit from networking opportunities with professionals working towards achieving justice, security and equal rights for Palestinians and Israelis.
- 4. Professional development through mentorship and training.

Time commitment:

The Education Fellow will work up to 15 hours per month, at times which will suit them as well as our team, to be able to accommodate a) monthly team meetings with the fellowships team and other Fellows, and b) bi-monthly meetings with the Education Officer, who will act as their supervisor. The suggested working hours can be assessed in case working hours need to be increased or decreased, depending on the amount of work and the Fellow's progress. The Fellowship will run throughout the 2024/25 academic year, from mid-October 2024 until June 2025.

Remuneration:

The Advocacy Fellow will receive remuneration for their work. The exact sum is subject to budget constraints and the strength of applications, and will be decided once applications have been reviewed and shortlisted, and by the time the interviews are conducted.



Location:

London. The Fellow must be available to attend the two mandatory Fellowship events in November 2024 and February/March 2025.
